### **SETTING THE SCENE**

### INTRODUCTION

Stracathro and Inchbare are situated within the rural countryside of North Angus; approximately four miles north of Brechin, to the west of the A90.

Stracathro is the name of the parish, and lends its name to the school, church and community hall. Inchbare is the hamlet located on the B966 between the A90 and Edzell. Together they comprise approximately 120 households.

The area is rich in history, with evidence of Neolithic Cursus monuments by Inchbare. The Romans under Agricola built a fort in AD75 on the banks of the West Water, and whilst it was used for only thirty years, it remains the Romans' most northerly site of permanent occupation.

On 16 April 1130, the Battle of Stracathro (also known as the Battle of Inchbare) took place between the forces of King David I and the rulers of Moray. The Royal forces, led by Edward, Constable of Scotland, were victorious.

Established in the grounds of Stracathro House in 1939, Stracathro Hospital was a wartime Emergency Hospital Service facility during World War II. Afterwards, it was developed as a District General Hospital and since 2005 it has been the site of the Scottish Regional Treatment Centre.

In the past, Stracathro Primary School has been threatened with closure. However, in 2018, local families fought a successful campaign for it to remain open.

Inchbare now benefits from a new affordable housing development. This public private partnership was delivered by Stracathro Estates in partnership with the Scottish Government's Rural and Islands Housing Fund Scheme. Named 'Stracathro Gate' after the distinct clavicular gateways of the Roman Camp, the new housing development welcomed six new families in 2022.

Whilst there is no main employer, the surrounding countryside is dominated by agricultural activity and the local population consists of households ranging from young families to retirees.

The community hall was built in 1932 and was extensively used until recently. There were monthly dance meetings, an active youth club and the primary school held their gym lessons there. Regular services at Stracathro Church ceased in 2021.

The area is rich in history, with evidence of Neolithic Cursus monuments by Inchbare.



#### STRATEGIC CONTEXT

The vision of the Angus Community Plan 2022 to 2030 is "Angus is a great place to live, work and visit".

The Community Plan comes at a time when many challenges are being faced, not least reducing funding for the public sector. The Plan outlines a commitment by Angus Council to work more closely and effectively together with stakeholders to deliver positive change and secure the best possible future for communities.

The Plan focuses on 3 key themes which collectively will create the greatest impact for local people - Economy, People and Place - and incorporates new 'Place Planning' legislation. This coupled with Community Wealth Building principles will pave the way for more effective partnership working.

### COMMUNITY-LED LOCAL DEVELOPMENT

Community-Led Local Development (CLLD) puts communities at the centre of identifying local needs and challenges as well as what projects and activities can address them.


Including communities in this bottom-up approach further empowers local people to become involved in developing solutions in response to the social, environmental and economic challenges their local areas face. When carried out correctly, CLLD can be an effective tool in generating a shared sense of commitment and ownership.

### **COMMUNITY ACTION PLANS**

Community Action Plans are a participatory tool used to build the capacity of communities in taking action in accordance with the issues, needs, and potential of the community. They describe what the community wants to achieve in the short, medium and long term through community and partnership activity.

In identifying our community aspirations, it is intended that the Stracathro and Inchbare Community Action Plan will assist Angus Council, Community Planning Partners and funding organisations better understand local issues and in turn allocate resources.

### **METHODOLOGY**

### STRACATHRO AND INCHBARE COMMUNITY STEERING GROUP

Following a preliminary meeting on 31 August 2022, the Stracathro and Inchbare Community Steering Group was established. Working with Angus Rural Partnership, the Steering Group oversaw the community consultation activities.

Every household within the study area was asked to complete the Place Standard Survey.

### PLACE STANDARD FRAMEWORK

The Place Standard framework is a Scottish Government tool which allows places to be assessed by their assets, strengths and weaknesses. It consists of 14 themes and short questions which cover both the physical and social environment for health, wellbeing and quality of life. The survey results were used to inform our community workshops and identify our Themes and Actions.




Entrance to Inchbare from the West

### **SURVEY PROCESS**

107 surveys were hand delivered by members of the Steering Group week commencing 31 October 2022. Recipients had the option to complete a paper version of the survey or complete it online.

### **SURVEY RESULTS (ranked by Weighted Average)**

In total, 81 surveys were returned. This equates to a response rate of 75.7%.

Stracathro and Inchbare's results range from Public Transport at 3.0 to Feeling Safe at 6.0. The average score is 4.2. 7 themes are below average and 7 are above average.




Figure 1: Place Standard Diagram


The Weighted Average scores are plotted on the diagram. Those towards the edge indicate there is little room for improvement whilst those closer to the centre indicate there is room for improvement.

However, the Place Standard Survey was more than just numbers. It was the beginning of the process and provided a starting point for further community consultations.

### **COMMUNITY EVENTS**

Community events were held on Sunday, 4 December 2022 and Wednesday, 7 December 2022. Both events allowed residents to view survey responses and engage with members of the Steering Group and Scott Petrie from Angus Rural Partnership.

The responses to the Place Standard Survey and community discussions subsequently helped identify key Themes and Actions.

### **KEY FINDINGS**


The community consultation activities identified a number of key findings:

- Residents feel safe living in Stracathro and Inchbare.
- There is a sense of community spirit, but community activity has reduced in recent years.
- Residents value the quality of the natural surroundings.
- The area is rich in heritage and history.
- There are few opportunities for residents to come together for social activities.
- Parking at the Primary School is an issue, especially when dropping off/picking up children.
- Broadband and mobile signal provision is inconsistent and at times poor.
- There is a lack of safe cycling and walking routes.
- There is no play area for children.
- A number of roads and pavements are in need of repair.
- The building formerly owned by Edzell Engineering at the north side of Inchbare is in poor condition and an eyesore.
- Speeding traffic through Inchbare is an issue.
- Public transport is infrequent and unreliable.
- Street lighting is inconsistent.



#### **MAKING IT HAPPEN**

This Community Action Plan sets out the Themes and Actions for Stracathro and Inchbare between 2023 and 2028. These have been identified by the community through a series of community engagement activities carried out between August 2022 and December 2022.

To date, the Steering Group (with support from Angus Rural Partnership) has overseen the community consultation activities which have informed the Themes and Actions.

Going forward, an important first step in preparing to deliver the Actions will be to create a new organisation. There are different legal structures available, and this new organisation must be:

- owned by the community,
- an incorporated body,
- · able to own land and buildings,
- able to raise its own funds, and
- willing to work in partnership with other community organisations and stakeholders to take forward the Community Action Plan.

The new organisation will act as an umbrella group for the co-ordination and delivery of the Actions. Angus Rural Partnership will continue to provide support to the Steering Group as it transitions to the new Stracathro and Inchbare community organisation.

### **THEMED ACTION GROUPS**

Whilst the new organisation is being developed, themed action groups will be established in order activity can be progressed. These will consist of interested community volunteers.

### **REVIEWING THE COMMUNITY ACTION PLAN**

This Community Action Plan has been produced with considerable input from the residents of Stracathro and Inchbare. We wish to build on that participation and enthusiasm and commit to keeping residents informed of progress and activity.
